WHAT'S HAPPENING IN ST FRANCIS CHURCH?

At last we may be taking the first tentative steps toward opening up the church building for prayer, praise and worship.

As you may well have seen in the media over the past week, plans are being put in place for places of worship to open up for private prayer as from 15th June.

Unfortunately because of the need to complete various risk assessments and ensure that hygiene and social distancing requirements are in place [the guidance has only just been made available] it looks as though we may have to wait until at least Sunday 21st June before we can open up our beautiful worship space to those who feel called to pray there.



In the first instance we would very much like to see the church open every Sunday afternoon between the hours of 3pm and 5pm.

With the prayer time drawing to a close at the Evening Prayer bell that has over past months been both calling the community to prayer, reassuring those who hear it that they are enfolded in God's love and reminding us all that are not alone – God is with us, always and everywhere.

Opening the church is very much dependent upon us having enough volunteers to assist in welcoming, hosting and ensuring that when each visitor leaves, the area they have used is cleaned and sanitized as required under the newly published guidelines.

This is a big undertaking, we not only have to welcome with love and offer our time to those who may seek sanctuary in the sacred space of St Francis church, but we have the responsibility of ensuring the good health and well being of every single individual who enters the building – ourselves included.

I do however, honestly and truly believe that just as we have risen to the challenges that have been placed before us thus far – so will be meet this challenge with integrity, patient perseverance and enthusiasm.

A WORD FROM THE VICAR

So, the great festival of Easter is over; we celebrated Trinity Sunday last week – and here we are in 'Ordinary Time'

It seems very strange to be talking about ordinary time at a time that is from from ordinary.

In fact nothing has ever felt stranger to me than these times we are living through at the moment.

The extraordinary thing that is called 'social distancing' is a case in point. Unless we are two metres apart we are not allowed to meet with family and friends, and even then outside only. We are not allowed to hug anyone other than those who share our household; not allowed to get alongside someone to share either their joy or their sadness.

This is for me the most difficult of all, but it is through this act of sacrificial social distancing that the good will come – just as wintertime heralds the spring, so these times of abstinence will make way for times of free expression of love and joy; compassion and sorrow; springtime indeed.

The colour the church uses to denote 'ordinary time' is green.; the colour of spring.

Green symbolises the idea that this is a time of growing and learning, living in the present and looking to a future filled with the flowering and fruiting that springs up from a time of growth.

In fact, ordinary time really isn't ordinary at all, it is actually a very special time indeed.

It may not be as exciting as the Easter season, as joyous as Christmastide; or as deeply moving as Lent and Holy Week, but ordinary time is filled with a richness to be discovered and explored.

As of now, perhaps, it is also a reminder that it is sometimes those things that we consider ordinary that must be cherished, valued and protected.

The way of life that Jesus calls us to is the Kingdom life; in God's kingdom every life is of equal value – every single part of God's beautiful creation is cared for and protected from exploitation and harm.

This kingdom way of living is something that we take for granted – they are our very ordinary Christian values, but, if we look at the world around us, they are considered by some to be quite extraordinary.

Unlike many in this world we live in, kingdom people do not believe that a persons worth is to found in the colour of their skin, the clothes they wear, where they live or how much money they have. Kingdom people work for the good of all, no matter who they are, and they want the best for this beautiful earth that we have been given as our home.

If all this sets us apart – so be it; I'd rather be considered extraordinary than buy into a way of living that knows the cost of everything but the value of nothing.

This particular season of ordinary time is, I believe, the beginning of our time. We have caught a glimpse of how good the world could be; and rather than lapse back into worldly ways this could be our opportunity.

Our opportunity to work with God to eventually bring about the day when the extraordinary Godly notion that the world can live in peace becomes as mundane and common place as this thing we call social distancing.

Just like social distancing, the idea of working together for a just and fair world and the good of the earth will take some getting used to – it will require lots of thought and effort, but eventually, if we really try, with God's help we can do it.

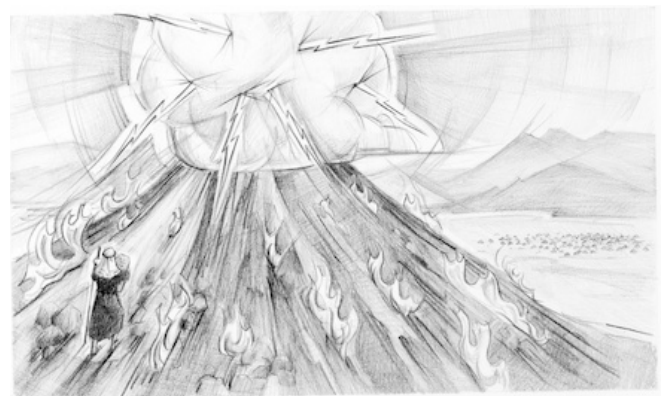

READINGS FOR 1ST SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

EXODUS 19: 2 - 8a



They had journeyed from Rephidim, entered the wilderness of Sinai, and camped in the wilderness; Israel camped there in front of the mountain.

Then Moses went up to God; the LORD called to him from the mountain, saying, 'Thus you shall say to the house of Jacob, and tell the Israelites:

You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself.

Now therefore, if you obey my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my treasured possession out of all the peoples.

Indeed, the whole earth is mine, but you shall be for me a priestly kingdom and a holy nation.

These are the words that you shall speak to the Israelites.'

So Moses came, summoned the elders of the people, and set before them all these words that the LORD had commanded him.

The people all answered as one: 'Everything that the LORD has spoken we will do.'

Moses reported the words of the people to the Lord

PSALM 100

1 Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth.

2 Worship the Lord with gladness; come into his presence with singing.

3 Know that the Lord is God. It is he that made us, and we are his; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

4 Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise. Give thanks to him, bless his name.

5 For the Lord is good; his steadfast love endures for ever, and his faithfulness to all generations.



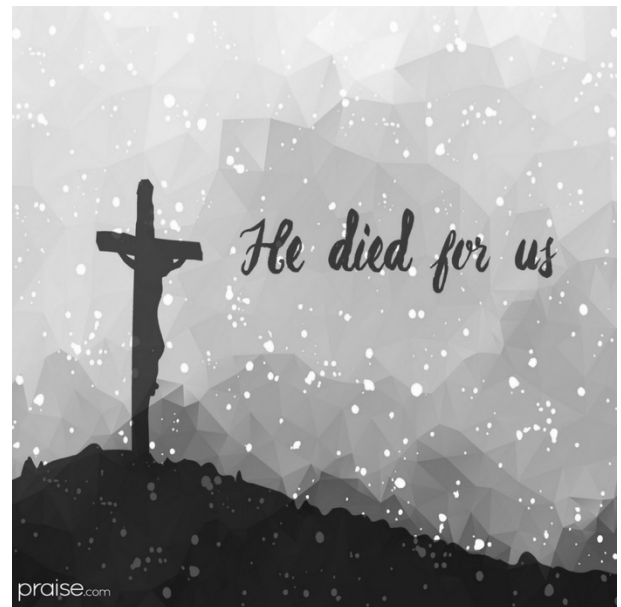
ROMANS 5: 1 - 8

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God.

And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us.

For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. Indeed, rarely will anyone die for a righteous person —though perhaps for a good person someone might actually dare to die.

But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us.



MATTHEW 9: 35 - 10: 8

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness.

When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd.

Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out labourers into his harvest.'

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits, to cast them out, and to cure every disease and every sickness.



These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon, also known as Peter, and his brother Andrew; James son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax-collector; James son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Cananaean, and Judas Iscariot, the one who betrayed him.

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: 'Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.

As you go, proclaim the good news, "The kingdom of heaven has come near." Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons.

You received without payment; give without payment.

REFLECTION FOR 14TH JUNE

What do we want our world to be like?



I was listening to Leroy Rosenior, the former Fulham footballer, (I remember seeing him play!) talking on the radio this week about the Black Lives Matter protests. He said that it is not enough to be 'not racist', we have to be 'anti-racist', which means being active in some way.

We also have to be active as we consider the world we want to see as we come out of coronavirus lock down, and let's not forget the connection with the environmental crisis: Inger Andersen, the UN's environment chief, says 'Our continued erosion of wild spaces has brought us uncomfortably close to animals and plants that harbour diseases that can jump to humans'. So, yes, the coronavirus pandemic is an environmental issue.

A recent YouGov poll found that only 9% of respondents wanted to go 'back to normal'. So whether it's on a personal, local, national or global level, what do we want to see?

Psalm 100



What has it got to do with Psalm 100? Everything!

First, most scholars agree that Psalm 100 was written in a challenging time for Israel, either leading up to or during their time of exile. Their very existence as a nation was under threat and people were asking deep questions, just as we are.

Though this Psalm might have started life in the temple, it was probably used in communities and homes, just like us. In my home and community I sometimes find it hard to worship a God who is 'good' when there is so much going on which seems to call God' goodness into question.

In the middle of this we get a psalm which either commands us, or at least encourages us, to worship God. 'Make a joyful noise....Worship the Lord....come into his presence...Know...enter... Give thanks....' Is this easy? No, but it is sometimes one of these things we just need to find a way to do.



At the same time, it involves our lives. When the writer says that the Lord is good, if we are made in the image of God, we need to do good ourselves to live up to that image. As Isaiah says, 'Learn to do good, seek justice...' (Isaiah 1:17) The psalm, says Marvin Tate, Professor of Old Testament Interpretation, includes 'a call to opt for the decisive, divine, "power structure" in human affairs against the claims of conventional power structures'.

How do we rebuild?



We need to line up with God's purposes in creation and history. The psalm starts with 'Make a joyful noise *all the earth*' and ends with 'his faithfulness *to all generations*'. So, if we wish to be good to the whole earth and all generations, all people, we will need to seek God's justice for all, now.

We will have to consider how we can rebuild from the pandemic in a way that allows all people to relish the goodness of God *to them*.

This means embracing a way of living that enables all to flourish and create, and holding to account those people, governments and businesses which destroy. One way of doing this would be to demand that the government invest in clean, fair energy and jobs, not in fossil fuels.



This means allowing our worship of God to embrace his goodness and justice, and our search for justice to joyfully embrace worship of God .

So, let us enter his gates with thanksgiving, and come into his courts with praise, and at the same time, take active steps to bring about the world we want to see, on a personal, community and national or global level.

What can we actually *do*? What about

- Finding a place to be still and look with thanks at what God has made. You could do worse than stand among the long grasses in the field at the back of the church, and then get involved with the vegetables!



- Get involved with Mousehold Defenders when things restart.

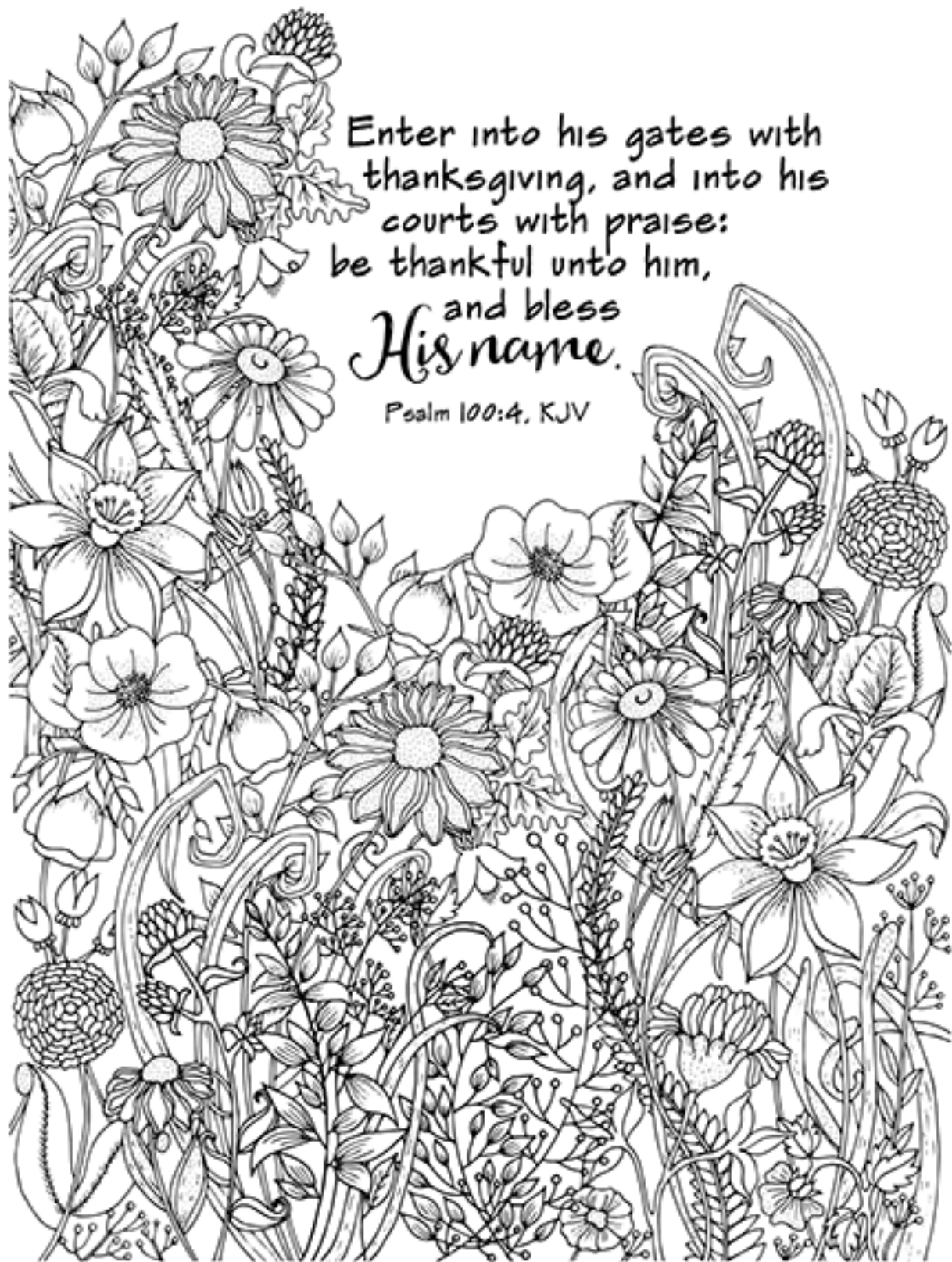

Psalm 100:4, KJV



Jesus gathered his twelve disciples and sent them out. He gave them these instructions:

‘Don’t go to Gentile or Samaritan towns. Instead go to the people of Israel, for they are like a flock of lost sheep. Tell people the good news about the kingdom of heaven. Cure the sick, raise the dead, heal those with skin diseases, send out demons. You have been given all this freely, for no payment. Now you must help others without being paid.’

Jesus reassured them, ‘You won’t need gold or silver; don’t take a travelling bag or an extra shirt; don’t take sandals or a walking stick. When you go into a town, find out who the good people are and stay with them until you are ready to leave. If you enter a home, bless it with your peace, but if it is not worthy, take the blessing back. If someone doesn’t welcome you or they won’t listen, leave at once, shaking the dust from your feet.

‘I am sending you out like sheep into a pack of wolves,’ he said, ‘so you need to be as wise as a snake and as innocent as a dove. Because of me people will hand you over to those in power and have you beaten. You will be dragged before kings and leaders. But if this happens, don’t worry about what to say – you will be given the words at the time. It will be God’s Spirit speaking.

‘Because of me there will be unrest in families,’ Jesus said sadly. ‘Brothers will turn against brothers. Fathers will turn against children. Children will turn against parents. Many will be hated because of me. But if you remain with me until the end you will be saved. If they persecute you in one town, run to the next. I promise that before you have been to all the towns of Israel, the Son of Man will come.’

Glossary

Gentile the name Jews give to non-Jews; **Samaritan** a person who lived in Samaria and worshipped God differently from Jews. Jews and Samaritans hated each other; **demons** spiritual forces that trouble people – could be interpreted as mental illness; **Son of Man** a title from the Old Testament Book of Daniel, used by Jesus to describe himself.

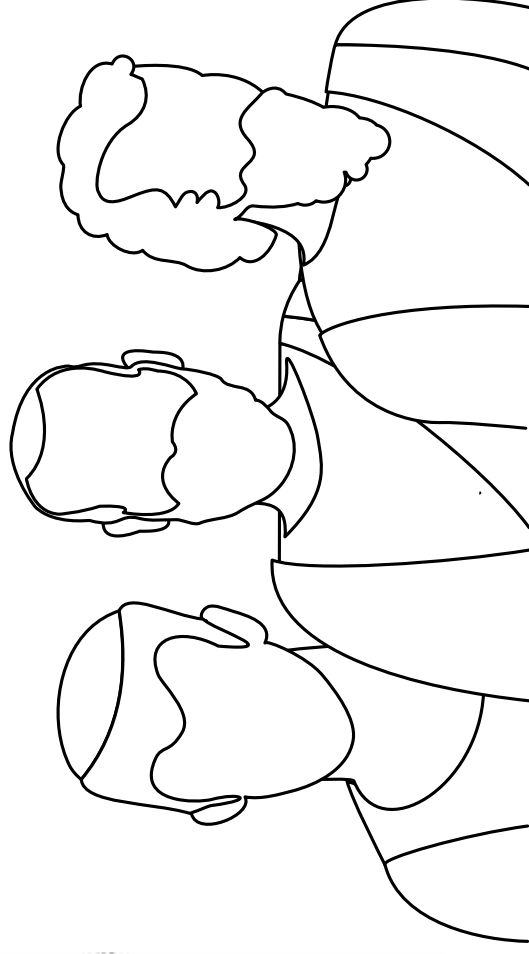

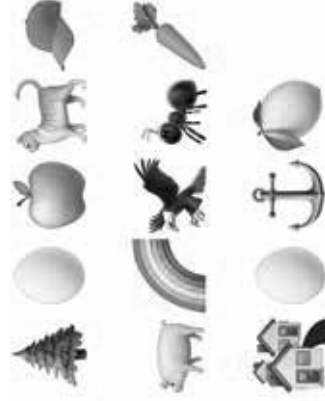
