So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh — for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, 'Abba! Father!' it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God,

He put before them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to someone who sowed good seed in his field; but while everybody was asleep, an enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and then went away. So when the plants came up and bore grain, then the weeds appeared as well. And the slaves of the householder came and said to him, "Master, did you not sow good seed in your field? Where, then, did these weeds come from?" He answered, "An enemy has done this." The slaves said to him, "Then do you want us to go and gather them?" But he replied, "No; for in gathering the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest; and at harvest time I will tell the reapers, Collect the weeds first and bind them in

Then he left the crowds and went into the house. And his disciples approached him, saying, 'Explain to us the parable of the weeds of the field.' He answered, 'The one who sows the good seed is the Son of Man; the field is the world, and the good seed are the children of the kingdom;


the weeds are the children of the evil one, and the enemy who sowed them is the devil; the harvest is the end of the age, and the reapers are angels. Just as the weeds are collected and burned up with fire, so will it be at the end of the age.

The Son of Man will send his angels, and they will collect out of his kingdom all causes of sin and all evildoers, and they will throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. Let anyone with ears listen!



REFLECTION FOR 6TH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

The parable of the wheat and the weeds – in some translations of the Bible the weeds are called tares; and when we look at a picture of the two side by side we see that wheat and tares look very similar indeed.



Which helps a lot in understanding what this story is all about.

It's about Judgement - trusting in God and God's judgement rather than our own.

No one talks much these days about God's judgement – it has dropped out of fashion; but I wonder if we are not all the poorer for that.

Certainly, it was an important issue for Jesus – he spent a good deal of time teaching his followers the principles of the Kingdom of heaven; how to live a life of Godly goodness, and God's judgement of our lives was certainly high on the agenda.

Today we live in a world where very little is ever talked of in terms of living a good and Godly life; a life of moral integrity, virtue, loving compassion and forgiveness.

In fact, in some quarters – anything goes, unless you get caught out - and then it's judgement by media, Facebook, twitter, and any other number of fashionable means of public humiliation.

A long, long way from the world of Jesus, his followers and the early church.

It is generally believed that The Gospel of Matthew was written for that early church - those first century followers of 'The Way' who needed to learn the Jesus way of life and behaviour and over the centuries Matthew has come to be viewed as the Gospel for the Church. It points out the way Church and Christians should follow.

Which leads us very neatly to St Paul and his letter to the early church in Rome.

Paul, like Matthew, also had no hesitation in respect of sharing his views on how Christ's Church, Christians, the new followers of the Way should behave.

He was passionate about wanting them to be knowledgeable about God, spiritually protected and practically prepared for the life that they had embraced.

To follow the way was not in those days – persecution and public humiliation in the form of beatings, imprisonment and execution were commonplace. They lived amid a culture of depravity and moral laxity; temptation and public ridicule were a constant feature of their lives.

Consequently, what they said and did, the way they were perceived by the communities they lived among and served was crucial; the gospel of Jesus was to be lived and preached in its purest form.

Paul wanted those early Christians, the followers of the Way to know and be assured that they were Kingdom people, citizens of the kingdom of heaven – released from the bondage of sin and death by the life, death and resurrection of Jesus; and that their hope should be in the promised coming of God's glory

They were real people, just like us – they lived in an uncertain world, faced the same human challenges we all face, were tempted and tested by the same desires and human failings that we live with day by day.

Only the difference between them and us is theirs was a far simpler world – and moral judgement for them was not a half forgotten concept controlled by flawed, failing, fickle humankind; they were taught, and they believed, that judgement belonged only to God.

It was God who had the final say; yes, human beings could humiliate, imprison, torture and kill the body – but it was God who would comfort the soul, give inner peace and the gift of eternal life.

Using Jesus' parable of the wheat and the weeds, life was understood to be an enormous harvest with good wheat and noxious weeds growing alongside one another, flourishing together until harvest time; leaving judgements about what was wheat and what was a weed in God's hands.

They lived by the truth that, ultimately, it is always the good wheat that is saved.

When you think about it, wasn't Jesus amazing?

Through a story about life giving wheat and polluting, unproductive weeds Jesus is telling us that the roots of good and evil can intertwine and as they grow together look very similar.

He is telling us that life is not easy nor is it uncomplicated – and it is far to easy to get entwined in evil.

But rather than trying to do God's work; what we should be doing is making sure that each one of us is increasing the wheat harvest; not living in fear of the weeds of the world.

We must understand that sometimes we have no choice than to wait patiently for harvest time – to co-exist with someone or something beyond our ability to comprehend or change until God intervenes and sorts out the muddle for us.

It is very tempting sometimes to look at others; at situations in life and start to judge - but what a mistake that might be!

Ultimately the harvest is in God's hands – it is God who will save us.

When we have God, our Abba; our strong rock and Redeemer who has promised us his Glory telling us 'Do not fear, or be afraid' - I say we should listen.

And do as we are told...

FOR OUR YOUNGER READERS...



Jesus told the crowd another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is a bit like someone planting his field with good seed. He is very happy, but at night, when everyone is sleeping, his enemy creeps in and plants weeds

among the wheat, then sneaks off again.

So when the wheat starts to grow, the weeds grow too!

'The servants then go to their master and ask him, "Sir, didn't you just plant good seed in your field? So where have all the weeds come from?" When the master tells them that an enemy has planted them, they ask, "So, shall we pull up the weeds?"

'But the master replies, "No, because if you pull up the weeds, you might pull up the wheat as well. Let them both grow together until the harvest. At harvest time I will send in the reapers, and then the weeds can be collected up, tied into bundles and burned. The wheat can be harvested and put in my barn."


Later, Jesus explained the parable to his disciples: 'Listen carefully. This is the story of my world. The master is the Son of Man, that's me. My friends are like the good seed, and my enemies are like the weeds that the devil has planted. The harvest is like the end of time, and my angels are the reapers who separate the wheat from the weeds in the field – the good and the evil in the world. All the evil is thrown away, like weeds on a bonfire, but all the good will shine like the sun in God's kingdom.'

Glossary

Reapers people who cut down the wheat at harvest time:

Son of Man a title from the Old Testament Book of Daniel, used by Jesus to describe himself;


Devil a personification of evil, also called Satan or 'the evil one'.




Can you draw what we would use to harvest wheat in the fields today?
