A WORD FROM THE VICAR

'You give them something to eat' said Jesus to his disciples. [see this weeks' Gospel reading]

I bet those poor blokes looked out over the thousands of people gathered in that place at that time and thought to themselves 'Blimey, He must be joking...' [or the equivalent in Aramaic of course]

I have to confess that many a time over the past few months I've looked at a task that has fallen to me and thought much the same thing. All I can say is, on every single occasion my scepticism has been met with clear examples of God's power in action.

I have stood and watched in amazement at the things that God has done right in front of my eyes.

Hundreds of food parcels going out from St Francis Free Food and over a hundred newsletters going out *every week* to name a couple of things that I consider to be miraculous.

All too often we think perhaps that a miracle just happens spontaneously – a bit like magic – but in reality miracles happen when we work with God; when he shows us what needs to be done – and we get on and do it regardless of whether we think it's possible or not.

All too often it's far too easy to be discouraged before we even begin something different or out of our comfort zone.

We can only imagine how those first disciples felt when Jesus encouraged them time and time again to step out in faith and trust.

And yet they did, with awesome results - and so should we. Whatever the challenge, whatever the task, if we approach it with prayerful attention and faithful trust, we too might witness yet another miracle.

See if you can spot your own miracle this week!

MATTHEW 14:13-21

Now when Jesus heard of the death of John the Baptist, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself.

But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns.

When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick.

When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, 'This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves.'

Jesus said to them, 'They need not go away; you give them something to eat.'

They replied, 'We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish.'

And he said, 'Bring them here to me.'

Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass.

Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds.

And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full.

And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.



REFLECTION

This week's gospel story is about a miracle, Jesus feeding 5000 men plus women and children by the sea of Galilee. It's particularly interesting that this is the only one of the miracle stories that appears in all four gospels, unless we include the resurrection accounts and general narratives about healing the blind. Not only that, the similarity between all four is striking, even down to the numbers of loaves, baskets of leftovers and people involved. Clearly, this was a story that was important to the evangelists, and one that contained important details.

Significant, I think, is the declaration in this story as to the identity of Jesus himself. There is no doubt that first century Jews would have seen a big connection between this mighty act of Jesus and the story in Exodus 16 of the feeding of the Israelites with manna from heaven. Jesus is therefore the new Moses. Contemporary Jews might also have been led to think of Deuteronomy 8 in which they were told that manna was a reminder; a reminder that they could not live by bread alone, but by the Word. Hence, the bread of heaven is also the word of God, which is the foundation of John's realisations in his gospel account as to the identity of Jesus.

There is also an echo in this story of 2 Kings 4, where Elisha orders a disciple to feed 100 men with 20 loaves of barley. It's fascinating that, in John's version of this story, the loaves are described as barley, too: barley was animal feed and so barley loaves would have been considered to be very humble fare. Hence, rather like the transfiguration story, Jesus is being affirmed as the fulfilment of

the law and the prophets, the true messiah – a very important theme in the gospels.

Above all though, Jesus is multiplying the loaves. He is creating them. He is shown in this story to be the Lord of all Creation; a Lord of all Creation who has compassion on his people, and who will provide in great abundance, if we were only to believe and trust in Him.

This week I am preparing myself for ordination to the priesthood which takes place, God willing, on Friday. It's an awesome undertaking that involves a lot of soul searching and struggle. I don't mind admitting that I'm really having to fight the impulse to break free and make a run for it. I'm also having to consider who I am meant to be, what it is, that God wants to use me for.

In the midst of all this, I noticed something in this story that holds huge significance for me.

I noticed that Jesus, having multiplied the bread, does not hand it over to the people Himself. He hands it to the disciples first. Only then then do the disciples give the bread to the assembled multitudes.

'For I received from the Lord that which I also delivered to you'.

We receive, then we hand over. That is a quote from St Paul, 1 Corinthians 11:23, where he affirms the words of institution: 'on the same night in which he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, He broke it, and said, "Take, eat, this is my body which is broken for you; do this in remembrance of me".

We receive, then we hand over. Surely this principle lies at the heart of all ministry, for all of us. It's what we do when we read scripture aloud in church. It's what we do when we express our faith by means of our approaches to ethics and inclusivity. It's what we *should* do when we consider and act on our view of our environment.

The disciples received, then handed over the bread as it was delivered to them by the Lord of all Creation. Have we done that with the world handed to us freely by the Lord of all Creation? I don't think so. In the future, our descendants will not be thanking us for mountains of plastic and poisons that we have dumped in the environment over the last decades.

We receive, then we hand over. From a priestly perspective, it's what I will be doing when I bless and break the communion bread, the bread of life, the breaking open of the word, to the people of God: the people of God, who are themselves a 'royal priesthood' (1 Peter 2:9).


We receive, then we hand over, we therefore *deliver*. The Latin word for deliver is from where we derive the English word tradition. So whereas many think today that tradition is something stuffy and old fashioned, it actually means to deliver that which has been handed down to us. I've had several conversations with people recently about traditions of the church; indeed, what is church? That's a debate will go on and on, but this story has really helped me with the question.

It's helped me to see that church is about delivering what we have received. And for me, church is about communion; about receiving that which has been delivered to us, just as St Paul said. Because, 'though we are many, we are one body, because we all share in one bread'. The bread of life. The body of Christ. And of course, we are all part of creation: the creation that has been delivered freely to us. Let's try to remember that. One of the reasons we are struggling with a pandemic is because of the disrespect human beings have for creation. That must surely change, and I think that change is one of the biggest things I associate with the coming of the Kingdom, however you may choose to interpret that phrase.

One last thing: people will always ask, is this story true? Jeffrey John, the Dean of St Alban's, tells a story about two RE teachers he had at school. One declared this story to be a divine mystery, the other said the story was simply about persuading people to share their packed lunches. Neither of these interpretations are satisfactory, and it's a complicated discussion. Suffice to say though, I think that, as with many of the gospel narratives, it is much more helpful if we spend less time wondering if they are true stories in the strictly factual sense. Maybe we are better to receive them – and deliver them - as stories about a much deeper and divine truth.


A truth that, I strongly believe, is well worth delivering.


